About Global Somali Diaspora

Global Somali Diaspora (GSD) is a global not-for-profit organization working to bring together and mobilize members of the Somali Diaspora for positive action. GSD advocates and promotes the full integration of Somali Diaspora communities within their host nations while also remaining connected to their cultural heritage. GSD encourages the members of Somalia's international community to contribute to their homeland by promoting peacebuilding, reconciliation, reconstruction, and development efforts in Somalia.

Established in 2014, after participants convened in a conference in Istanbul, Turkey, today GSD has representatives from Somali communities around the world, including the United States, United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, Norway, Sweden, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Italy, Denmark as well as other countries in Africa and Asia.

It is a foundational belief of GSD that a connected and unified Somali diaspora offers great opportunities to meet the challenges of their host countries, while also playing a strong and positive role in the rebuilding of Somalia.

Mission

GSD has been established to advocate, implement, and support projects, programs and initiatives that advance the cultural and social development of Somali diaspora communities, as well as make a positive contribution to the rebuilding of Somalia.

Vision

To holistically empower members of the Somali diaspora to realize their full potential while also empowering them to contribute to the building of harmonious, cohesive, educated, informed, creative, powerful, and prosperous communities both in their host nations and their homeland.

Objectives

GSD seeks to mobilize, organize, and empower Somali communities living in the diaspora. We want to provide a platform to improve communication and ties between members of the global Somali diaspora and serve as a focal point of action and advocacy on issues of importance to their communities. We will also promote the language, culture, and heritage of the Somali people, as well as enhance the capacity and skills of young Somalis living in Somalia and in the diaspora. Lastly, GSD aims to contribute greatly to the development and rebuilding of Somalia.

Global Somali Diaspora's International Conference, Helsinki 2022

Youth and Women, Employment, Entrepreneurship, and Investment: Break the Bias, Break Inequality

This year's conference topic has been inspired by the Somali Youth Diaspora's reflection on the challenges faced by Somali youth and women in the diaspora and homeland as well as the proposed partnerships work between GSD & SOMINVEST at the Ministry of Planning, Investment and Economic Development of the Federal Government of Somalia in collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation.

Many studies have shown how women, youth, disabled people and marginalized clans face continuous challenges to accessing equal opportunities regarding the employment market and investment opportunities. Many international and local organisations have developed programmes to address these issues. However, challenges on the ground supersede what has been delivered so far and Somali-led initiatives are essential to explore appropriate and sustainable solutions which address current inequalities and social exclusions.

Therefore, this conference will focus on how to narrow this gap and widen access to equal opportunities in all mentioned areas for youth, women, and other disadvantaged groups within the community.



To achieve this, the conference focused on employment, entrepreneurship & investment, and the role of the Somali diaspora. The GSD's conference is aiming to fill the aforementioned gap by bringing together experts from different backgrounds that can contribute to a Somali-led initiative on

equality and social inclusion within our society including supporting the advancement of entrepreneurship and investment in partnership with SOMINVEST, Office of Somali Diaspora, private sector, non-governmental organisations, international communities as well as improving essential social services including but not limited to education, health, environment and addressing social-economic challenges.

Our Aims

To improve employment, entrepreneurship and investment prospects for disadvantaged youth, women and other marginalised people as well as strengthening partnerships between GSD, SOMINVEST, Office of Somali Diaspora and other key stakeholders to increase equal opportunities and social inclusion within Somali society and Somali diaspora engagement in investment.

Why Finland

As mentioned by the Finnish government in their four strategic goals for 2121 – 2024, Finland has a large Somali-Finnish diaspora who are active Finnish citizens in socio-economic, cultural and political areas in Finland as well as key contributors to the rebuilding of their homeland.

Additionally, the Finnish government has been one of the key supporters of Somalia's peacebuilding and rehabilitation by hosting Somali refugees who fled from civil war and Finland's growing investment in development collaboration and awareness is feasible in Mogadishu, Somalia which has strengthened the connection between Finland and Somalia.

Finland recognises that Somalia is not only about the challenges but a country with great opportunities through its natural resources, strategic location and its young generation.

Therefore, trade between Finland and Somalia has increased recently with the improving security situation. Finnish companies have started to enter markets in Somalia through Finn-partnership, digitalisation and renewable energy may lead to business and investment opportunities in future. The Somali diaspora in Finland plays an active role in the commercial cooperation model developed by the Finnish Government. And as Finland aims to increase its trade with African countries there is a great opportunity to increase the trade and investment tie between the two countries.

Likewise, the themes chosen this year to align well with Finland's strategic priorities in gender equality and social inclusion as well as entrepreneurship and investment.

Therefore, to promote the Finnish-Somali diaspora role and acknowledge the Finnish Government support to the Somali community and country, GSD has decided to hold its annual conference this year in Helsinki, Finland which is the first face-2-face international conference after the COVID-19 pandemic.



Benefit of Host Country

To advance and endorse this growing and mutual relationship, GSD would like to hold its largest international diasporic conference in Helsinki. That will further deepen this cooperation and business relationships between our two societies.

The GSD International conference in Finland will attract around 300 delegates consisting of Intellectuals, prominent academics, businesspeople, international and government officials, civil society and diaspora coming from all continents. This will put Finland on the spot-on international level and bring social, economic and cultural benefits to the country. Many Somali businesses will be attending the conference and could lead business investment in Helsinki and other cities in Finland. The hosting city will benefit from welcoming hundreds of international delegations that will promote the travel and tourism of the city and the overall country.

High-profile delegates from Somali Federal Government, European Union, the United States and United Nations will be invited which again will promote the profile of the country and it will strengthen further collaborative opportunities between the Finnish and Somali people.

Helsinki and Espoo

Helsinki is the capital city of Finland and sits across a series of islands in the country's southern region. The city boasts a youth buzz, with outdoor cafes, restaurants and an active nightlife. Since the 1980s, Helsinki has been home to a large number of Somali immigrants, some of whom are now proud Finnish citizens. Today the population of the Somali-Finnish community stands at roughly 20,000. This is two-thirds of all Somalis in the entire country of Finland.

Espoo is a municipality that lies 25 minutes from Helsinki's centre, it's part of Helsinki's Greater Metropolitan Area. It is the second most populous city in Finland after Helsinki. The area has five centres and is a hub of culture and business.

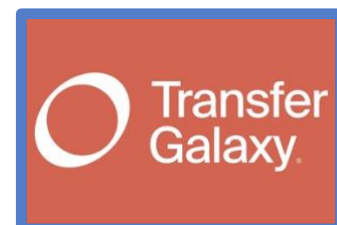

DAY ONE - Friday, 21st October 2022

Introductions

The day was hosted by Abderahim Hussein and Habiba Ali, two local members of the Somali diaspora in Helsinki.

The GSD's Chairperson Jawaahir Daahir who opened the conference acknowledged and thanked the Somali Diaspora in Finland for their hospitality, resourcefulness, proactiveness and their great role in planning and hosting the conference particularly GSD's representatives in Finland Nimco Noor, Abdifatah Jama from ASDA RY, Abdirahim Husu from Moniheli RY, and Somali Finnish Network.

The Prime Minister thanked the GSD Team for holding such an important conference. The Somali PM acknowledged the essential role the Somali diaspora plays in all aspects of Somalia's future developmental, economical, and humanitarian areas. The Prime Minister also urged the Somali Diaspora to provide additional support in the fight against terrorism, as well as financial help to the areas where the terrible droughts have affected.

Keynote Speakers

Said Sheikh Abdi, Senior Regional Strategic Advisor, Regional Office for East and Horn of Africa, International Organization for Migration (IOM)



Said Sheikh spoke about the Somali diaspora contribution in investing in livelihood of Somali nation affected by the droughts.

Alexandra Singpiel, DRC Representative, DEMAC Coordinator

Alexandra Singpiel, DEMAC Coordinator spoke eloquently about DEMAC’s work in coordinating the diaspora efforts to response emergency situations in their homeland.

Anders H Knudsen from Danish Refugee Council explained how remittances is supporting setting up businesses for Somali families in Jigjiga, Ethiopia and assisted by DRC.



Ahmed Darwish, Financial Trader, Investor, Author and Host of “Fikradaha Muhiimka Ah” Podcaster and Educator

Ahmed Darwish discussed the importance of finance and investment within the Somali community, and highlighted how crucial it is for Somali people to be more business-savvy. He also touched on topics, such intellectual property and branding.



Mustafe Osman Ibrahim, from Galaxy Transfer

Mustafe spoke about founding Galaxy transfer in 2015, and highlighted how the business has grown ever since. He encouraged the crowd to be more active in the business sector.



Panels

1. A panel led by Ahmed Abdirahman Omar and including Anders Helge Knudsen and Bazi Sheikh discussed the Somali diaspora and their contribution to investing in livelihood of Somali nation affected by the droughts/floods.

2. Dr Idil A Osman, Lecturer at Leicester University led a discussion on local Somali women social entrepreneurs; opportunities and challenges, addressing what women in business need in Somalia (in terms of business support). The panel consisted of Lul Salad Ibrahim, Abdinor Dahir, SOMINVEST – virtual, Amino Deeble – Business Owner and Sikhulile Dhlamini, Programme Manager (Labour Mobility and Human Development), IOM Somalia.



3. Abdirashid Fidow, Operations Manager of Anti Tribalism Movement led a panel discussing the role of media in informing educating the public about the impact of these agreements will have on their day-to-day life so that they feel ownership of the project.



4. Fadumo Ali led a panel discussion on Catalytic capital to empower and invest in women social entrepreneurs that will counter inequalities & respond to the climate crises and the state of social enterprises - challenges, threats,



opportunities, and lessons learnt in Africa. Panellists included Anders Helge Knudsen, DRC representatives, Abdirahman Bashir – World Bank -virtual and Sahra Mohamed, Entrepreneur and business owner.

DAY Three - Saturday, 23rd October 2022

Introductions

As usual, the day started with introductions by our host Maryan Abdulkarim, with Qur'an recitation by Ustad Abdifatah M Sayidali, with a welcome address by GSD's Board Member, Ali Ware.



Keynote Speakers

Said Faadi, CEO of Wadaagsan Company LLC

Said Faadi spoke about the Wadaagson Project taking place in Garacad seaport. A great example of an indigenous Somali company making progressive changes to the country's seafont. This project entails the construction of a port at Garacad coastal town. It will open up the central Somalia regions and eastern Ethiopia for easy trade with the outside world especially the gulf countries.



Guleed Ahmed, Somalitoons Founder



Guleed Ahmed spoke about his digital company, Somalitoons, which is an app that features cartoons for little children, with the voices being dubbed in Somali. The cartoons are a great way for little children, especially those in the diaspora, to take an interest in learning the Somali language.

Mahad Salad Abdi, Youth Wing Board Member of GSD

Mahad Salad Abdi spoke about his involvement with GSD, and how it's helped him connect with his Somali peers from across the world. He also spoke of how important it is for young people to get involved in organisations such as GSD.



Remarks by GSD Board Member Nimco Noor

Nimco Noor spoke about the advantages that Somalia has as a country, speaking about its vast coastland, and its opportunity to become a haven for fishing and sea farming. She also spoke about her life in Finland and the Somali community in Helsinki and Espoo.

Panels



1. Fauzia Mohamed Hashi, Refugees Consultant and Family Adviser led a panel discussed leadership and entrepreneurship among youth and women, and the biases against them. They also spoke about the reluctance of our youth in taking up technical jobs, like fishing, and how it's important for us to encourage our youth to have strong work ethics and be proud of working for what they aim to achieve. Panellists included Lul Salad Ibrahim, Amal Mohamed and Abdikarim Shire Mohamed.
2. Natasha Jolob, Director of Kai-zen Global, Social Enterprise Adviser, led a panel on Impact investor/ funders, and how to build a road map to investing in the Horn of Africa. The Panellists included Abdinor Dahir, Senior Adviser of SOMINVEST, Abdirizak Awel Mohamed, Entrepreneur and owner of First Cup Coffee and Tea, and Hamdi Sheikh, GSD's Board Member

Closing Remarks by Chair of GSD

Closing remarks were made by our distinguished Chair, Jawaahir Daahir, MBE. She spoke highly of the contributions delegates had made to the conference and thanked them for taking part in the special event. She highlighted how she saw that participants were all engaged and interested in a bright future for Somali peoples, both in the diaspora and at home.

The event was then closed by Chair, as he handed out awards for those who made the event possible.

Somali Cultural Night Hosted by Somali Finnish Network

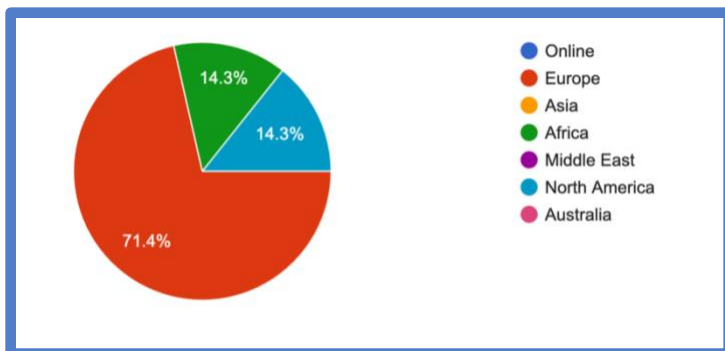

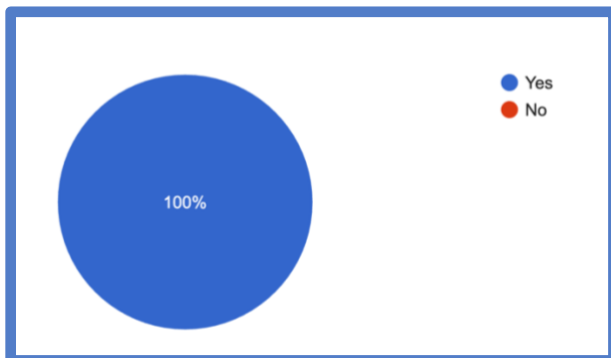
Feedback from Participants

Summary

- It is evident from this report that the Global Somali Diaspora, as an organisation, and as a people have made grounds in far reaching countries around the world, and the pressing concern of their homeland is one of their primary concerns. They are taking steps in the right direction to address these issues by building relationships between Somali and their host countries, as it is evidenced by the relationship between the Somali communnality and fellow Finnish nationals.
- The youth in Somalia need to be encouraged in taking up employment and being solid benefit to their country. We as a diaspora have the responsibility to build these values into our children and invest in their wellbeing, through investment efforts to the country.
- Similar can be said of women in the country, as their counterparts, Somali women in the diaspora, are doing incredibly well in the global stage, and it is important to enrich our young women and girls in the values of hard work. This is essential in combatting the gender parity in Somalia and cultivating a truly equal society.
- The participants in the conference all shared their experiences of working with the Somali diaspora, and how well they are able to contribute to the growing crises occurring the country, from famine, drought, and other economic issues, while also highlighting positive outcomes in the worlds of business and entrepreneurship through the country.



Message from Chair



The main aim of the conference was to bring together the leading Somali diaspora in business and investment sectors, academics, researchers, technocrats, practitioners, and other key stakeholders to exchange and share their expertise and experiences on all aspects of investment, entrepreneurship and employment issues within our community and homeland.

It was also meant to provide a platform to present and discuss the most recent innovations, trends, and concerns as well as everyday challenges faced, and solutions adopted in the conference theme.

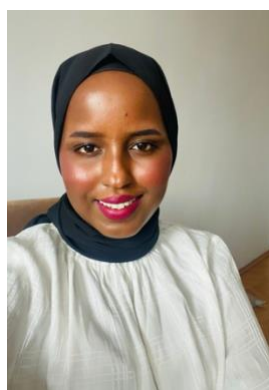

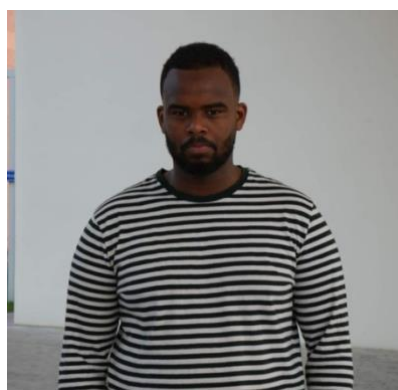
